


BPWA's Annual Meeting, November 16, to Focus on Preparing for Emergencies


On Thursday, November 16, at 7p.m. at The Hillside Club, our keynote speakers will be Khin Chin, of Berkeley's Office of Emergency Services, and Acting Fire Chief David Brannigan. They will present simple, specific steps that you can take to prepare your household for disasters, both those that call for immediate evacuation, like a fire, and those that could require sheltering in place, like an earthquake.



Start: Cragmont Rock Park

Join Aleta George, author of *Ina Coolbrith: The Bittersweet Song of California's First Poet Laureate*, on a four-mile loop walk on the roads and pathways named for some of the Bay Area's literary pioneers. A highlight will be the <u>stairway that BPWA renamed</u> in Coolbrith's honor, where the Berkeley Historical Society and the Berkeley Historical Plaque Project have installed an informational plaque on Coolbrith. Aleta developed this route during her frequent walks when she was writing her book. On the walk, Aleta will tell stories about Coolbrith and her colleagues <u>Bret Harte</u>, <u>Joaquin Miller</u>, <u>and Charles</u> <u>Keeler</u>. This walk has stairs and some steep streets.

Berkeley's Changing Ground: The Hayward Fault, Landslides, and Volcanoes Saturday, November 18 @ 2:00 p.m.

Leader: Andrew Alden

Start: Codornices Park Playground

The steep residential hills of North Berkeley owe their picturesque qualities to three great geological forces: mass wasting (landslides), tectonism (earthquake faulting), and volcanism (lava flows). Andrew, who has a <u>blog</u> that focuses on East Bay geology and is writing a book on the subject, will take us on a 3.3-mile route with

informative stops at Berkeley's distinctive rock parks. We'll explore vivid signs of past volcanic activity — thankfully, no longer a threat! Along the way, we'll also encounter evidence of giants *in* the Earth: large active landslides, the inexorable Hayward Fault, and marks left by mammoths during the Ice Age when Berkeley was even more unusual than it is today. Expect stairways and some hilly streets, which may be slippery with dead leaves.

Start: Entrance to Tilden Park Little Farm, by parking lot. Join us for a peace-filled, musical stroll through nature. We will meet at the Little Farm to strum for the sheep and croon for the cows. Joel will provide the music for peace-themed songs. From the farm, we will walk to the Rotary Peace Grove and Wildcat Peak, where we will take in the sweeping views from the Bay to Mount Diablo. We will return by way of the Laurel Trail, singing and playing instruments as we go. Bring your voice and your portable instruments. Families are welcome. This 3 1/2 mile walk is on uneven trails and includes some steep hills.

Remembering Betty Olds

Without the seed money from long-time Berkeley City Councilwoman Betty Olds, we might never have had a BPWA map (now in it's 7th edition). Her early, unwavering support for the public pathways was crucial to all we've accomplished in the last 19 years. Betty passed away in July, and we will honor her by walking together, enjoying nature, and building community. This 1 1/2 hour walk will meander through the North Berkeley Hills. We'll visit Betty's namesake path as well as Ann Brower Path, Ina Coolbrith Path, and others. We'll also see the fire station near the gate to Park Hills, which Betty fought to have built after the 1991 Berkeley-Oakland Hills fire. The route will include many stairs and some uneven footing, though our pace will be leisurely. Because Betty loved animals and was the moving force behind Berkeley's new Animal Shelter, your dogs will be welcomed on this walk.
